On August 18th and 19th, a food festival named "The Nagaoka *Chishô-Chisan** Festa" was held. During a program hosted at the Nagaoka Grand Hotel, approximately 90 participants were amazed and fascinated by French and Turkish dishes that were served one after another. A Japanese chef from the hotel and an owner-chef from a prestigious Turkish restaurant in Tokyo prepared all the dishes, from hors d'foeuvres to dessert by using locally-grown *kinchaku nasu* (round eggplant) in artistic ways.

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Nagaoka, Ishinomaki, and Hawaii United in the Pursuit of Peace with Prayers for a Complete Recovery in Areas Affected by the East Japan Earthquake



On August 2nd, the 2012 Nagaoka Fireworks Show was graced with approximately 1,000 consecutive shots of wide star mines (a special form of fireworks in Japan) launched to the soundtrack of "Kono Sora no Hana (Flowers of This Sky), the Story of Nagaoka's Fireworks." The colorful flowers with our thoughts for the pursuit of peace were in full bloom over Nagaoka.

In appreciation of the support provided by many people throughout Japan during the time of our disaster in 2004, phoenix-shaped fireworks were also launched. The lively phoenix flew over Nagaoka this year as well, inspiring and encouraging catastropheaffected people.



During the Ishinomaki River Opening Festival in Miyagi Prefecture on August 1st, a mini-version of Nagaoka's phoenix-shaped fireworks took flight this year as well with prayers for a complete recovery of the disaster-affected areas. Oblong message cards sent by Mayor Mori of Nagaoka City, Mr. Obayashi (the film director of *Kono Sora no Hana*, the Story of Nagaoka's Fireworks), and children from Yamakoshi were attached to this year's phoenix-shaped fireworks shells, expressing our encouragement for the disaster-stricken people in East Japan.

At City Hall Plaza – *Aôre* Nagaoka, a section to remember the 1945 Nagaoka air-raid victims was set up for three days from August 1st. Many visitors dedicated flowers there in memory of the 1,482 air-raid victims. Ms. Sharon Weiner and five other representatives from the Japan America

Society of Hawaii also visited the site and presented white chrysanthemums. The cities of Honolulu and Nagaoka became sister cities in March, 2012.

Nagaoka's Ancient Pottery on Display at the British Museum





A piece of *Kaengata Doki* (Flame-Type Pottery) and a piece of *Ôkangata Doki* (Crown-Type Pottery) from Nagaoka will be on display at the British Museum in London, UK, from October 4th, 2012 to January 20th, 2013. The display will be titled "Special Exhibition–Flame and Water Pots: Prehistoric Ceramic Art from Japan."

The British Museum asked the Nagaoka Science Museum for permission to display these two pieces of ancient earthenware vessels that were excavated at the Iwanohara historic site in Nagaoka. The British Museum appreciates that a

Nagaoka's historic pottery, which will be on display in the special exhibition hall situated next to the main entrance of the British Museum, will certainly draw the attention of many visitors. Since approximately six million people visit the museum annually, this will provide a great opportunity for Nagaoka to convey to the world the proud beauty of

Nagaoka's ancient earthenware.

What to Do with Recyclable Materials

The following recyclable materials are being collected free of charge at seven locations in the city on Saturdays and Sundays.

Items	Specifications	How to Put Out	
Reusable Glass Bottles	Bottles (720ml/300ml) with an "R" mark, brown or green bottles (1,800ml), and beer bottles	They should be rinsed out with water and put out (with their lids on) in bags or cardboard boxes.	
Used Clothing	Clean clothing in good condition including stockings, socks, underwear, kimono, etc.	They should be washed and put out in transparent bags that are tied shut.	
Used Tableware	Ceramic, metal, and glass tableware in good condition (except for chopsticks)	They should be wrapped with paper and put out in bags or cardboard boxes.	
Small Electrical Appliances	Their length, width, and height should be a maximum of 50 centimeters each.	They should be put out (with no batteries) as is or in transparent bags.	
Glass Bottles, Cans, and PET Plastic Bottles Waste Paper, Newspapers, Magazines, Flyers, and Cardboard	They should be put out in the same manner as putting them out at trash collection sites in your neighborhood on your designated days.		
Cooking Oil	Used or unused cooking oil	Solid substances should be removed and oil should be put out in transparent or translucent containers. Unused cooking oil should be put out as is.	
Footwear	Shoes and sneakers in good condition (except for boots, wooden clogs, sandals)	Soil should be removed from the soles. Clean shoes and sneakers should be put out in transparent bags that are tied shut.	
Bags and Belts	Bags and belts in good condition (except for hard bags such as suitcases)	Bags and belts can be put out together in transparent bags that are tied shut.	
Mixed Paper (paper combined with other materials such as coatings)	Shredded paper, processed paper such as milk cartons, detergent cartons, photos, and envelopes with plastic windows, etc. (excluding silvery coated paper, oiled paper, tissue paper, stickers)	Milk cartons packs or detergent cartons should be washed and dried. All-mixed paper should be put out in transparent bags that are tied shut.







The One Hundred Sacks of Rice Festival is a celebration of the autumnal harvest. It is also an occasion to hand down to future generations Nagaoka's historic event cherished by the Spirit of One Hundred Sacks of Rice.

The Spirit of One Hundred Sacks of Rice is a concept stressing that city development is dependent on education. Nagaokans take pride in and draw courage from this teaching, which originated in a historic event that took place after the end of the civil war of 1868.

The festival will have many fun-filled programs including street performances, a 46.6-km relay, and a flea market. There will also be a parade (starting around 3:00 p.m.) of approximately 500 people dressed in *samurai* warrior costumes from the Boshin



Civil War of 1868 and ancient gorgeous costumes of the Makino Clan going up to Edo (present-day Tokyo) for alternate-year attendance to the Shôgun. A skit dramatizing the historic One Hundred Sacks of Rice story will also be performed.



Warnings against Arson

The Nationwide Traffic Safety Campaign Friday, September 21 – Sunday, September 30

An increasing number of traffic accidents are likely to happen in fall because it is the season for outings and it gets dark earlier than in summer. All pedestrians and drivers are advised to keep the following safety tips in mind.

- Pedestrians and bicycle riders should wear reflectors.
- Turn your lights on early at dusk when driving a vehicle and riding a bicycle.
- All drivers and passengers are required by law to wear seat belts. Child seats should also be properly installed and used.

• Never drive a vehicle if you have drunk any alcoholic beverages and never let anyone who has drunk alcohol (even a small amount) drive a vehicle.

Q&A for resolving conflicts between employers and non-Japanese employees from abroad

- Q: I work for seven and a half hours a day from Monday to Friday. During this summer holiday, my employer asked me to work on some holidays and I worked for seven and a half hours each day. I was paid the normal wages for the day against my assumption that I should be paid increased wages for working on holidays. Is it lawful for my employer to do that?
- The Labor Standards law stipulates that it is legal for employees to be paid normal wages instead of increased ones for overtime work when they have worked for eight hours or less a day, and 40 hours or less a week regardless of their working on company rest days.

If you work on company rest days and end up working more than the legal working hours (40 hours a week), you are entitled to be paid at a rate of 25% or more above your normal wages for excess hours.

If you work on rest days (legally designated as one day a week, or four days or more for four weeks), you are entitled to be paid at a rate of 35% or more above your normal wages. (Article 37)
