

### Kosodate no Eki (Child-Rearing Support Facility) in Every District of the City

In addition to the four current child-rearing support facilities (*Chibikko Hiroba*, *Gun Gun*, *Teku Teku* in Central Nagaoka; *Suku Suku* in Tochio), more multigenerational child-rearing support facilities will open in the city's nine other districts by April 2016.

One of the city's mottos is "to develop Nagaoka into a community where the citizens can support and join child-rearing." The new facilities will be set up in nursery schools or public buildings and managed by the city

or private organizations. Citizens of all ages are welcome to any of these facilities where everyone can have a good time even on rainy or snowy days.




### The Nagaoka Youth Employment Organization

In order to prevent depopulation and turn the city into a place where the citizens, especially younger generations, can enjoy life, the City of Nagaoka inaugurated a comprehensive strategic project named the "Nagaoka Rejuvenation Project" on October 21<sup>st</sup>.

This project aims to ensure that younger generations continue to live in Nagaoka, return to Nagaoka, or move into Nagaoka. Under this project, the city will establish the Nagaoka Youth Employment Organization in December 2015.

Aiming to promote regional revitalization, this innovative idea will help students (from the three universities, one college, and 15 vocational schools all located in Nagaoka), businesses from the industrial and financial sectors, and the administrative sector come together to seek new potential for the future of the city.





### A Project to Preserve Earthquake-Affected Houses

During the 2004 Great Chûetsu Earthquake, large-scaled landslides blocked the Imo River in the Yamakoshi District, which partially buried 40 houses of Kogomo Village with mud and water. Two of the houses still stand in the mud while the others were all demolished. However, these two old houses are deteriorating year after year, facing harsh weather conditions such as snow damage.

The owners of the houses and the people of the community wish to preserve these houses as reminders of the earthquake. In order to come up with the best way to preserve these houses, the city's engineering team removed the mud around the houses and started surveying their conditions. In collaboration with the national and prefectural governments, the city will discuss proper measures to preserve these houses where they originally stand.

### Promoting the *Nishikigoi* Industry (multi-colored ornamental carp)



Cherishing *Nishikigoi* as our regional treasure and a symbol of recovery from disaster, the Cities of Nagaoka and Ojiya designated *Nishikigoi* as the City Fish in October 2014.

Being the original birthplace of *Nishikigoi*, the two cities established the Committee to Promote the *Nishikigoi* Industry in the hopes that our communities be rejuvenated through the breeding and marketing of *Nishikigoi* around the world. The committee also aims for the *Nishikigoi* industry to be certified as a Globally Important Agricultural Heritage System. The Yamakoshi District enjoys welcoming many overseas buyers of *Nishikigoi* and exporting *Nishikigoi* to over 30 countries.



*Nishikigoi* admirers visited Nagaoka from the Netherlands, the UK, and other countries on the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the establishment of a *Nishikigoi* breeding farm. (October 21)

### Nagaoka's Ancient Pottery Will Be on Permanent Display at the British Museum

Several pieces of Nagaoka's ancient pottery, *Kaengata Doki* (Flame-Type Pottery), will be on permanent display at the British Museum in the U.K. from October 2016. Since approximately six million people visit the museum annually, this will provide a great opportunity for Nagaoka to show to the world the proud beauty of Nagaoka's ancient earthenware.

Back in 2012, a piece of *Kaengata Doki* along with other types of ancient pottery were also on display at the museum for four months, which drew over 110,000 visitors.

In Nagaoka, there is a movement campaigning for a *Kaengata Doki* design for the 2020 Tokyo Olympic and Paralympic Cauldron.



### **Safety Tips on How to Use Space Heaters**

Most Japanese houses are not centrally heated. Space heaters and room air conditioners are widely used. Typical heating devices usually used in Japanese houses are:



If your heater is not equipped with a pipe for exhaust fumes, please be sure to ventilate your room. You are likely to feel sick or dizzy and even become unconscious if you stay too long in a room filled with carbon monoxide caused by imperfect combustion. Check and maintain the safety of space heaters before using them.

- \* Do not use space heaters near flammable items.
- \* Do not place heaters near doors or curtains.
- \* Do not dry your laundry using space heaters.
- \* Do not hang your laundry over space heaters.
- \* Do not move space heaters while they are on.
- \* Keep a proper distance between you and space heaters.
- \* Be sure to ventilate your room.
- \* Turn off kerosene heaters when refilling their kerosene tanks.
- \* Fill kerosene tanks in a safe place away from any flames or burning materials.
- \* Turn off space heaters before you go to bed.











### Warnings against Traffic Accidents ~ Drive Carefully! ~

There have been an increasing number of serious and fatal traffic accidents happening in the area under the Nagaoka Police Jurisdiction.

### Drivers are advised to drive carefully by keeping the following tips in mind:

- Pay due attention to your forward view and try to anticipate any possible hazards including bicycle riders or pedestrians.
- Be sure to make a complete stop at a stop sign and check the surrounding area.
- Keep a safe distance between your car and the car in front.
- Turn your lights on early at dusk.
- Drive carefully at night even if traffic is not so heavy.
- All drivers and passengers are required by law to wear seat belts. Child seats should also be properly installed.

#### Pedestrians are advised to walk carefully by keeping the following tips in mind:

- Pay due attention to the left and the right when crossing a street.
- Try to avoid going out in the dark.
- Wear bright clothes or reflectors when going out at night.

### **Penalties for Illegal Bicycle Riding**

Bicycles are considered to be light vehicles by the Road Traffic Law. Violators will be punished. Intoxicated riders will receive a sentence of a maximum of five years in prison or maximum fine of 1 million yen. There is a maximum penalty of ¥50,000 for riding at night with no lights. There is also a maximum penalty of ¥50,000 for riding while using a cell phone, smartphone, or headphones. You are always encouraged to ride safely by following the traffic rules.



In fall, *Tsuwabuki* grows in colonies along the Historic Path in the Teradomari District. The path is dotted with various historic sites such as *Shûkan En* Historic Park (the former site of a wealthy family) and *Mitsuzôin* of Shômyôji Temple (the Buddhist monk Ryôkan's former temporary lodging.)
