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### A Special Coaching Session with World-Class Australian Swimmers



Australian swimming team members (two coaches and four swimmers) visited Nagaoka, their host town for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics. The swimmers included two junior

world record holders. On October 14<sup>th</sup>, they gave a special coaching session to about 200 local elementary and junior high school students at Daiei Probis Swimming Pool. It was part of the city's educational program entitled "Creating

Educational Programs with Enthusiasm, Excitement, and for Building Dreams."

At the Niigata Prefecture Sprint Championship held on October 15<sup>th</sup>, the Australian swimmers showed their excellent swimming skills, which greatly inspired Nagaoka's young swimmers. Up until the 2020 games, the city will

welcome Australian swimmers to stay in Nagaoka to train in preparation for four upcoming international swimming championships.



### A Historic Flag Made Its Homecoming





On October 6<sup>th</sup>, Mr. Michael Carr (President and CEO) and Mr. Michael Weidenbach (Curator) of the Battleship Missouri Memorial visited Nagaoka from Pearl Harbor, Honolulu, Hawaii. Their mission was to return a historic flag to the people of Japan and to the City of Nagaoka, birthplace of Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto.

At the flag presentation ceremony held in the Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto Memorial Museum, Mr. Carr stated, "The flag has been in our possession for many years but it was clear to us that our ship was not the place for this flag to rest. In war, this flag flew over the Japanese battleship NAGATO, the flagship of Admiral Yamamoto, Commander-

in-Chief of the Combined Fleet. Today it is a reminder of war's tragic consequence and a fitting symbol of our shared hope for lasting peace among nations. We are honored to share this historic flag with the City of Nagaoka, whose citizens suffered the devastation of war. Today, we continue the tradition of peace by returning this flag to its rightful home."

Mr. Carr and Mr. Weidenbach also visited the Nagaoka War Damage Exhibit Hall, which the city established to tell younger generations of the 1945 Nagaoka Air Raid.

Their mission to return the historic flag to Nagaoka was made possible by the special bonds that have developed between the two war-related museums in Nagaoka (the Nagaoka War Damage Exhibit Hall and the Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto Memorial Museum) and the three war-related museums in Pearl Harbor, Honolulu (the Battleship Missouri Memorial, the Arizona Memorial, and the Pacific Aviation Museum.)



### Sending Out Our Thoughts to the World Fireworks in Memory of War Victims and for the Pursuit of World Peace Friday, December 8<sup>th</sup> 8:15 p.m.

In order to express our wishes to convert all the bombs of the world to fireworks, fireworks including three shots of White Chrysanthemums fireworks will be launched at *Suido* Park on the day the Pacific War between Japan and the U.S.A. broke out in 1941.

### To Further Promote Nuclear Safety Measures



On September 27<sup>th</sup>, Mayor Tatsunobu Isoda had an inspection tour of the Fukushima Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant, which experienced an unprecedented nuclear accident six and a half years ago.

The chief executive official of the plant explained to Mayor Isoda some of their current measures for decommissioning their reactors and treating contaminated water. After that Mayor Isoda had a tour of the central control room of the No. 12 reactor, contaminated water storage tanks, and the main antiseismic building, which served as the headquarters during the critical times after the crisis first happened.

Mayor Isoda found decommissioning operations extremely difficult. He stressed, "We absolutely must protect our community from any possible nuclear accident." On October 20th, he also visited the Kashiwazaki-Kariwa Nuclear Power Plant and confirmed the current conditions of the No. 7 reactor and the newly built tide embankment.

The City of Nagaoka should put every possible effort into ensuring the safety and security of our community from any nuclear accident. Mayor Isoda's current visits to these nuclear power plants are expected to help the city to further promote its nuclear safety measures.

### A Replica of Flame-Style Pottery on Display at Haneda Airport



An exhibit to promote Japanese cultural heritages entitled "The Flame-Style Pottery Unearthed in the Shinano Basin and the Culture of Snowy Regions" was held at the domestic

flight lobby of Haneda Airport for three days from October 13th. Visitors were welcome to touch a replica of ancient

pottery named flame-style pottery and feel its special features first hand.

The exhibit included panel displays introducing the culture of snowy regions and a current movement campaigning for a flame-style pot design to be used for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics cauldron.

Many visitors also enjoyed tasting sake that Nagaoka's 16 breweries produced with the utmost loving care.

### Promoting Regional Features along with A Line-Up of Japanese Sake







A special area to promote regional features opened in CoCoLo on the second floor of Nagaoka Station building on October 5<sup>th</sup>. At a section named *Ponshukan*, visitors can enjoy tasting various brands of sake brewed by the 90 sake breweries in Niigata Prefecture including the 16 breweries in

Nagaoka. You can taste five cups of different kinds of sake out of 111 brands for ¥500.

Hanabi no Hiroba (Fireworks Plaza) has various displays introducing the Nagaoka Fireworks, the 400<sup>th</sup> Anniversary since the establishment of Nagaoka, and *Nishikigoi* (multicolored ornamental carp). This section will continue to introduce a variety of regional features in turn.

At the opening ceremony, Deputy Mayor Shinji Takami emphasized, "We hope many people visit Downtown Nagaoka and the city's 11 districts through this entrance. The city fully supports this great endeavor."

### **♦** Current Topics in Nagaoka **♦**



This year marks the 13<sup>th</sup> year since the 2004 Great Chuetsu Earthquake hit our city. The Gathering for Recovery was held in the Yamakoshi District. About 300 residents joined the event and flew balloons in memory of the victims, in appreciation of the support provided by many people, and with wishes for a complete recovery. (October 23)



Groups of volunteer firemen from 15 locations in the city joined a firefighting drill held on the riverbanks of the Shinano. Envisioning a deluge of fire such as the one that spread out in a dense residential area in Itoigawa City last December, about 570 volunteer firefighters and 54 firefighting vehicles joined the event. (October 8)



The snow-melting pipe system, called *shôsetsu paipu*, utilizes the natural heat energy of groundwater sprayed over the surface of roads. The first experimental snow-melting pipes were installed in Nagaoka City in 1961. Workers are busy checking the conditions of the 352-kilometer long pipe lines installed in the municipal roads before the snowy months arrive. (October 4)



Members from Regional Promotion Committees visited the Mishima District. They encountered special features of the district such as the Illuminated Bamboo Lantern Road Festival and the giant Japanese cedar tree in the Rengeji area. They proposed various ideas to create more attractive events for young generations to join. (October 3)



The national, prefectural, and municipal government offices jointly held a snow removal operation inauguration ceremony. This winter, a total of 602 vehicles from 171 companies will be dispatched for removing snow from approximately 2,400 kilometers of roadways in Niigata Prefecture. (October 18)



There was an employment opportunity promotion session with representatives from 46 colleges and universities located in and out of Niigata Prefecture and 52 business firms located in Nagaoka City. The representatives from local firms stressed the special features and advantages of the city's working environment in the hopes that more college graduates develop an interest in working in Nagaoka. 

### **Traffic Rules for Cyclists**

### Cyclists should always observe and follow traffic lights and signs.

Cyclists who repeatedly commit these hazardous acts two or more times within a span of three years are required to attend a cyclist safety lecture session. Cyclists who refuse to attend the lecture session will be fined up to ¥50,000.

### **Major Hazardous Acts**

- · Disregarding traffic lights
- · Ignoring stop signs
- Violating riding rules in walkways
- · Riding while intoxicated
- Entering a railroad crossing after the crossing bars have lowered
- · Riding a bicycle that is not equipped with properly-functioning brakes
- Riding while using a cell phone or holding an umbrella/parasol





### This Month's Useful Japanese Expressions Kuruma no Taiya Kôkan (くるま の タイヤ こうかん・車のタイヤ交換)

In this section you can learn Japanese expressions and get information useful for your daily life in Japan.

Before the snowy months arrive, you are advised to replace regular tires with special tires for winter. Tires you use in winter are called studless tires or snow tires.

Snow-covered and icy roadways are very slippery and you cannot easily stop your car on such roadways. Therefore, you need to replace regular tires with special tires before the arrival of winter.

Kuruma no Taiya Kôkan (tire replacing) services are available at car dealers, repair shops, service stations, or gas stations. When snow starts falling, these places will be

crowded with many drivers who rush to have their tires replaced all at once. We recommend you finish *taiya kôkan* as early as possible.

If you keep a snow brush in your car, it will be useful to remove any snow accumulated on the windshield,

windows, and the roof of your car because the snow may obstruct your front view, which is very hazardous. Please drive very carefully on slippery snow-covered and icy roadways.

### **Safety Tips on How to Use Space Heaters**

Most Japanese houses are not centrally heated. Space heaters and room air conditioners are widely used. Typical heating devices usually used in Japanese houses are:



#### sekiyu sutôbu

(kerosene heater with/without exhaust pipes or fans)



denki sutôbu/denki hîtâ (electric heater)



#### gasu sutôbu

(gas heater with/without exhaust pipes or fans)



*e-a-kon/reidanbôki* (air conditioner)



hot carpet

(electric carpet)



kotatsu

(low table with an electric heating device)

Here are some safety tips on how to use space heaters.

- Do not place any flammable objects around space heaters.
- Do not place heaters near doors or curtains.
- Do not dry your laundry using space heaters.
- Do not move space heaters while they are on.
- · Stay a proper distance away from space heaters.
- Be sure to ventilate your room.
- Turn off kerosene heaters when refilling their kerosene tanks.
- Make sure to close the lid of the tank tightly after refilling it.
- Fill kerosene tanks in a safe place away from any flames or burning materials.
- Turn off space heaters before you go to bed.
- Check and maintain the safety of space heaters before using them.







### Some Useful Tips for Protecting Yourself from Catching Influenza



We are more likely to come down with a cold when it gets chilly. This is also the season in which many people catch the flu. The common cold virus and influenza virus are different. When you have a cold, you may have some symptoms in your throat or nose. Influenza usually brings about high fevers ranging from 38 to 40 degrees Celsius (100.4-104 degrees Fahrenheit) and affects your whole body with symptoms such as headaches, joint pains, or muscle pains. Here are some useful tips for preventing the flu.

- Wash your hands and gargle when you return home.
- Sufficient sleep and nutrition will help you resist diseases.
- · Avoid crowds.

The flu season is usually from November to April. You are advised to get a vaccination against influenza prior to the flu season. Please contact a clinic for an appointment.

Here is a useful Japanese expression. If you want to get a vaccination against the flu, you can say "Influenza *no yobô sesshu o uketai desu* (I want to get a vaccination against the flu)."

You are advised to get proper treatment within two days after being infected by the flu. If you have symptoms such as high fever, muscle pains, joint pains, etc., immediately visit a clinic and get treatment as soon as possible.

### **Important Information about Tax Deductible Social Insurance Premiums**

Your premiums or payments for the National Health Insurance, the Medical Insurance System for the Elderly Aged 75 or Over, the Public Nursing-Care Insurance System, and the National Pension Plan are all deductible on your tax return. You need to follow the proper procedures to claim your payments as a tax deduction.

Tax deductible social insurance premiums include:

National Health Insurance

(国民健康保険・こくみん けんこう ほけん/Kokumin Kenkô Hoken)

National Pension

(国民年金・こくみん ねんきん/Kokumin Nenkin)

- Medical Insurance for the Elderly
- Nursing Insurance for the Elderly

At the beginning of November, the Japan Pension Service will send out the Social Insurance Premium Deduction Certificates(社会保険料控除証明書・しゃかい ほけんりょう こうじょ しょうめいしょ/Shakai Hokenryô Kôjo Shômeisho).

When applying for a tax deduction, attach the certificate to the application form (Return Form for Insurance Premium Deduction/保険料控除申告書・ほけんりょう こうじょ しんこくしょ/Hokenryô Kôjo Shinkokusho).



### Please Pay Your Taxes by the Due Date

Taxes in Japan are classified into two categories. One is the national tax that is collected by the national government and the other is the local tax that is collected by the local governments. Foreign nationals working in Japan are also required to pay income tax (the national government tax) and the residential tax (the local government tax).

If you forget to pay your taxes, a reminder or a demand notification will be sent. Late charges are continually added until your payment is completed.

#### If you leave your taxes unpaid:

- ①Your assets will be investigated at financial institutions, insurance companies, and your workplace.
- 2) Your property and assets may be subject to seizure.
