The 400th Anniversary of the Establishment of Nagaoka Chapter 1

The Year 2018 Celebrates the 400th Anniversary of the Establishment of Nagaoka. Let's look back on Nagaoka's 400-year-old history.

In 1618, the Makino Clan was appointed to rule the Nagaoka feudal domain by the Tokugawa Shogunate Military Government. The first lord, Tadanari Makino (1581 - 1654) held the fief of Nagaoka, which yielded 74,000 *koku*. This measure of *koku* was used to show how much each feudal domain was allowed to yield in crops of rice.

Tadanari Makino was born as the first son of the Makinos in Ushikubo Mikawa no Kuni (present-day Toyokawa City, Aichi Prefecture) in 1581. Yasunari Makino, Tadanari's father, was a lord of Ushikubo Castle. Tadanari Makino entered Echigo Nagaoka in 1618. The Makino Clan reigned over Nagaoka for 250 years by emphasizing its guiding philosophy known as 常在戦場・じょうざいせんじょう (Jôzai Senjô), which means "always have the spirit of being on a battlefield."

The Nagaoka City Emergency Medical Support System at 119

In the jurisdiction of the Nagaoka City Fire Department Headquarters, ambulances were dispatched 10,094 times and took care of 9,372 patients in 2016. The city is proud of its system that can quickly respond to 119 callers as soon as possible. The statistics for 2016 below show that Nagaoka's ambulances arrived at scenes quicker than in any other municipalities of Japan.

Patients are taken either to their family doctors or one of the city's three general hospitals including the Nagaoka Red Cross Hospital, the Nagaoka *Chuô* (Central) Hospital, and the Tachikawa Sôgô (General) Hospital. The admission rate to a medical facility for first contact is 95% and 100% for second contact.



Medical records of registered patients are confirmed via tablets. which can help the medical staff quickly provide the appropriate treatment.

Individual Number (Kojin Bangô) or "My Number"

A 12-digit *kojin bangô* (individual number) is issued to every registered individual living in Japan. Starting in November 2015, notice cards called tsûchi kâdo with kojin bangô (individual number) have been sent to residential addresses via registered mail. Your individual number is necessary for various procedures at public offices and other related places. Please make sure to keep your notice card secure and do not lose it. Also do not unnecessarily give out your individual number to other people.

You can also apply for Kojin Bangô Kâdo, an Individual

Number Card, at the city office. This plastic card will have your individual number and your facial photo on it. You can use this card as an ID card.

By using your Kojin Bangô Kâdo (Individual Number Card), you can get a copy of your residence certificate (jûminhyô), seal registration certificate (inkan tôrokusho), family register certificate (koseki shômeisho), and income and taxation certificate (shotoku kazei shômeisho) at around 110 convenience stores in Nagaoka, starting on February 1st, 2018.



The Nagaoka Institute of Design **Stepping into A New Phase**



The Nagaoka Institute of Design (NID) was established as a publicly-built and privately-operated college in 1994. It has been four years since NID was reborn as a municipal university corporation in 2014.

The design-oriented institute has enthusiastically promoted and strengthened bonds with the local community and business sector. A variety of unique educational programs have attracted students from many parts of Japan. Since becoming a public college, there are five times as many applicants as there are open enrollment slots.

Teikyo Nagaoka High School Finished Third in the Winter Cup 2017



The National High School Basketball Winter Cup 2017 was held at the Tokyo Metropolitan Gymnasium at the end of De-

cember, 2017. The Teikyo Nagaoka team finished third by defeating Fukuoka Daiichi High School (the 2016 champion team), 69 to 58. This is the first time for a high school in Nagaoka to place third. After placing fourth in the previous Winter Cup, the Teikyo Nagaoka High School team also became one of the top four teams in the Summer National Inter-High School Tournament in 2017.

Important Information about Annual Income Reports ~Tax Withholding Slips and Filing Final Tax Returns~



If you are a registered resident in Nagaoka City as of January 1st, 2018, you are required to report your annual income to the City Office by Thursday, March 15th 2018.

If you do not report your income by submitting a final income tax return form, various documents might not be issued including income verification certificates, which are necessary when applying for children's enrollment in nursery school, public housing, or business fund loans. Premiums for your National Health Insurance or Nursing Care Insurance and nursery school fees might not be calculated either.

In Japan, income earners are required to pay income tax (shotokuzei しょとくぜい・所得税) and residential tax (jûminzei じゆうみんぜい・住民税). The income tax is customarily deducted from your eSarnings when a payment is made by your employer. Then, the deducted amount for the income tax is paid to the government's tax office (zeimusho ぜいむしょ・税務署). This custom of prior deduction of income tax from your earnings is called gensen chôshû (げんせん ちょうしゅう・源泉徴収).

The appropriate annual amount of income tax to be paid is finally computed when all the earnings of the year are determined at the end of the year to find out whether you have paid too much or too little.

You are required to file a final income tax return if you have received payments from multiple employers. This filing is called *kakutei shinkoku* (かくてい しんこく・確定 申告). For your earnings in 2017, you can file a final income tax return from Friday, February 16th to Thursday, March 15th, 2018.

Tax withholding slips (gensen chôshûhyô げんせん ちょうしゅうひょう・源泉徴収票) that were sent to you from your employer(s) are needed when you file a final income tax return. In addition to this, due to the introduction of the Individual Number (Kojin Bangô / My Number) System, your individual number and personal identification documents (such as your residence card) are needed when you submit your final income tax return form and other necessary documents. These requirements started with income for 2016.

If the total amount of your earnings is relatively small, there is a possibility that you will be able to have some of your income tax returned. This practice is called kampu (かんぷ・還付).

On the contrary, you may be required to pay additional income tax if income taxes have not been deducted from relatively large amounts of your other additional earnings.

As for the residential tax, no prior deduction is made. A bill (nôzei tsûchisho のうぜい つうちしょ・納税通知書) for the residential tax will be sent to you in June (in June 2018 for earnings in 2017) when your total amount of earnings is determined. If your total amount of income for the year is relatively small, you will not be required to pay the residential tax. In such a case, a residential tax bill will not be sent to you.

Every individual working in Japan is required to pay the residential tax, regardless of his or her nationality. In principle, it is imposed on your total annual income beginning on January 1st of every year.

The residential tax must be paid to the municipality where you were registered as a resident on January 1st of that year. There are two ways of paying the tax. It may be deducted from your monthly wages, or you can pay directly to the city at a financial institution.

When paying at a financial institution, you have the choice of a one-time payment or a four-time installment payment.

The residential tax for this year, 2018, is calculated based on your total annual income for the year 2017. If you do not report your income by submitting a final income tax return form, the residential tax for the year cannot be determined. Please be sure to report your annual income of the previous year to the Citizens' Tax Division of the Nagaoka City Office or the Tax Division of each district office by Thursday, March 15th, 2018.



At Nagaoka *Mirai Juku* (a learning program for the future), 37 junior high school students expressed their future ambitions. During this learning program, instructors, experts, and professionals from various fields of interest talked about their experiences. The students discussed what they learned from these professionals before making their own presentations. (January 21, 2018)

Warnings against PM2.5

Atmospheric particles less than 2.5 micrometers in diameter are referred to as PM 2.5, which are air pollutants. Because of their small size, the fine particles can enter deeply into the lungs, which can cause health problems such as asthma and bronchitis. The atmospheric concentration of PM 2.5 is constantly checked at 12 monitoring stations in Niigata Prefecture including Jôoka Monitoring Station in Nagaoka City.

If PM 2.5 levels become elevated:

- The Niigata Prefectural Government Office will issue warning information.
- Information will be distributed via radio and TV broadcast.
- Nagaoka City will distribute information via its website and information vans as well as to schools and welfare facilities.

If PM 2.5 warnings are issued:

- Refrain from going outside and avoid intense physical activities.
- · Wear a surgical mask when going outside.
- Avoid opening windows or using ventilation unless absolutely necessary.
- Children, the elderly, and patients with respiratory or circulatory problems are advised to be careful when moving around by carefully considering their health condition.
