Chapter 5

Nagaoka's fireworks display began in the Edo period (1603 – 1867). According to an old record of events, 3inch to 7-inch fireworks shells were launched in 1821 as signal fires. They were named "Innumerable Stars in the Sky" and "Stars in the Galaxy."



A chronicle compiled in 1879 by a former clansman of the Nagaoka feudal domain has a painting depicting fireworks launched in the daytime. In the painting there are a couple of samurai warriors on a street and construction workers watching

the fireworks. Fireworks have been admired by many citizens on various occasions in Nagaoka since the Edo period.

During the 2018 Nagaoka Peace Festival on August 1st, pyrotechnicians from Toyokawa in Aichi Prefecture, the home of the Makinos (lords of the Nagaoka feudal domain) shot up fireworks from big hand-held bamboo launching tubes on Ote Street. It was truly

amazing to watch big pillars of flames reaching for the sky.

Population and Households As of July 1st, 2018 (compared to the previous month)







The 2018 RoboCup **International Competition**





An international competition for robot operating skills was held in Montreal, Canada in June.

The Cat-Bot (a group of students from the National Institute of Technology, Nagaoka College) finished second in the RoboCup Junior Soccer Open League, in which 28 teams from 20 countries competed.

The Nexis-R (a joint group of local firms and students from the Nagaoka University of Technology) finished third in the RoboCup Rescue League in which 22 teams from ten countries participated.

Mayor Isoda highly praised their success by hoping that their efforts help Nagaoka's younger generations and future entrepreneurs explore the possibilities of developing new business opportunities in the field of technology.

Come and Meet Toki, the Japanese Crested Ibis!

"Toki Mi~Te" (literally meaning "take a look at toki") is the name of an observation cage set up at the Learning Center for Japanese Crested Ibis and Nature in the Teradomari district. The facility is also known as the Nagaoka City Toki Breeding Center. The toki, with its beautiful toki-colored (light pink) wings, is an internationally protected bird.

In order to help toki reinhabit the natural environment on Sado Island, the city has been part of a project to breed and raise toki since October 2011. A total of 39 chicks were born so far at this facility. The center will open to the public starting on Saturday, August 18th. Visitors can enjoy observing *toki* from as close as 2 meters.



How to Ride a Bus in Nagaoka



How to Ride a Bus

Get on the bus via the rear door. When getting on, take a riding ticket from the ticket machine. It has a number indicating the point of the bus route. Riding tickets are not given out at the starting point of the bus route. When you want to get off, press one of the buttons near the windows or seats after the name of your bus stop is announced.

Stop Button

Press this button before getting off. Fares are displayed on a fare display board at the front of the bus. To find out how much your fare is, match the number on your ticket with the number on the board.

Fare box/Money Changer

Put your fare and your riding ticket into the fare box beside the driver and get out of the bus via the exit door. If you don't have exact change, use the money changer beside the driver. However, you are always advised to have exact change.

Notes:

- If you accidentally put in too much money into the fare box, you will not get a refund in the bus. However, if you tell the driver about it, the driver will fill out an excessive fare claim slip and give you a copy. Take the copy to an Echigo Kotsu information office (located on either side of Nagaoka Station) to get a refund.
- The money changer only accepts \(\frac{\pma}{1}\),000 bills.
- You are advised to refrain from using the money changer while the bus is in motion.
- Commuter pass users are required to show their pass clearly to the driver.
- · Credit cards are not accepted.
- You can also use fare coupons (*kaisûken*), which are economical because they are sold at a discount price.

Choinori Bus Service with Special Discount Tickets for Local College Students

This service is named "Choinori Bus (a casual bus ride)," and is specially for the students of the three universities, one technical college, and 15 vocational schools in Nagaoka. The bus fare from the bus stop nearest each campus to Nagaoka Station is just ¥100 per trip.

How to Ride the *Choinori* Bus

- Fill out an application form, available at each campus bookstore/office or the Nagaoka-*Wakamono-Shigoto Kiko* office (2-3-1 Ote Dori, 0258-86-6008), with your name, address, phone number, and the purpose of your ride. Submit your application form there and purchase a booklet of tickets with 11 ¥100 tickets for ¥1,000 there at the same time.
- ・Register your digital user certificate (riyôshô/利用証・りようしょう) via QR code or go to https://www.choinoribus.net and log in with your device. You are required to renew your registration in April every year.

Notes:

• Hours for *Choinori* bus service

Weekdays: 10:00 a.m. - Final bus

Saturdays, Sundays, and National Holidays: All day long

- You cannot use this bus service to commute to school.
- You cannot get on or off the bus at other stops.
- You can only ride a bus via the route indicated on your individual *Choinori* bus ticket.

- •Use any regular bus service provided by Echigo Kotsu Co. from the nearest bus stop of your campus to Nagaoka Station.
- ・When getting on the bus, please make sure to take a riding ticket (seiriken/整理券・せいりけん) if it is necessary.
- ・When getting off the bus, show your digital user certificate (riyôshô/利用証・りようしょう) to the driver, who will check its date of validity and its flashing image. (Please prepare to show your device well in advance before getting off the bus.) Then put your riding ticket (seiriken/整理券・せいりけん) and a ¥100 bus ticket into the fare box beside the driver.

registered as of the date of the checkup. However, if a child is expected to move to another district, a health checkup will be possible at a school in the district.



Warnings against Sun-Stroke or Heat-Stroke (Necchûshô/ねっちゅうしょう/熱中症)

You are likely to suffer from sun-stroke or heat-stroke during hot summer days with high temperatures. Here is some important advice on how to protect yourself from sun-stroke or heat-stroke.

Some Precautions to Reduce the Risk of Sun-Stroke or Heat-Stroke:

- Use a sunshade, such as a parasol or a hat.
- Wear light, loose-fitting clothing.
- Drink plenty of liquids from time to time.
- Rest in the shade from time to time.

If You Feel Symptoms of Sun-Stroke or Heat-Stroke:

- drink plenty of liquids.
- loosen up your clothing.
- evacuate to a cool, shaded area.



Liquids for sports activities are advisable. Supplements of salt will be helpful as you may have lost salt when perspiring. Putting a wet towel on your hands, legs, and feet will cool down your body temperature.

If a patient seems to be fading in and out of consciousness or is not able to respond clearly, immediately call an ambulance. You may suffer from sun-stroke or heat-stroke again, even if you feel you have recovered from it. Please make sure to seek medical treatment even if you feel you have recovered.



This Month's Useful Japanese Expressions

In this section you can get some useful information for daily living and learn related Japanese expressions.

110 (*hyaku tô ban*/ひゃく とう ばん) **119** (*hyaku jûkyû ban*/ひゃく じゅうきゅう ばん)

110 and 119 are emergency telephone numbers in Japan. In case of a crime, theft, robbery, or a traffic accident, dial 110 to contact the police. In case of a fire, dial 119 to reach the fire department. If you need an ambulance for the sick or the injured, also dial 119. If you have dialed 119, tell the operator whether a fire (kaji) has broken out or you need an ambulance (kyûkyûsha).

The operator will ask you what, where, and when the incident has happened. The operator will also ask your name and phone number. Please stay calm when you respond to the operator. These emergency calls are free of charge. You can also call 110 and 119 free of charge from your mobile phone.





Warnings against Typhoons



Many typhoons often develop and approach Japan during the typhoon season from summer to autumn, causing tremendous damage every year. Approaching typhoons often cause strong winds and heavy downpours, so you are advised to stay inside. During a typhoon, do not leave things like your laundry or trash outside, because strong winds easily pick them up.

As a gust of wind may break windows, you are advised to stay away from windows. Typhoons often bring heavy rain, so you are advised to stay away from rivers and bridges. Please try to get information about typhoons via TV or radio broadcasts. When evacuating, carefully check the conditions around you and do not evacuate by yourself, if possible.
