### The 400<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Establishment of Nagaoka Chapter 6



The Kome Hyappyô Matsuri (One Hundred Sacks of Rice Festival) is held annually on the first Saturday of October. The highlight of this festival is the Echigo Nagaoka Historic Samurai Warriors' Procession. A total of over 500 people join this parade. The history of



this event goes back to the *Niwaka* Procession, a costume parade in which people dressed up in their unique costumes and walked around neighborhood streets. When celebrating the 300<sup>th</sup> Anniver-

sary of the Establishment of Nagaoka, many citizens of Nagaoka joined and enjoyed the *Niwaka* Procession.


In commemoration of the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the establishment of the modern municipality of Nagaoka in 1986, based on the *Niwaka* Procession, the Historic *Samurai* Warriors' Parade was first held and later became the Echigo Nagaoka Historic *Samurai* Warriors' Procession as a part of the *Kome Hyappyô Matsuri* (One Hundred Sacks of Rice Festival).

During the festival, actors portraying Lord Tadanari Makino and Princess Makino (from the Nagaoka *Han*, the feudal domain) ride on a float. Foot soldiers of the old Nagaoka troop demonstrate a battle of the *Boshin* Civil War, which attracts many spectators.

# The Peace Festival Celebrating the 400<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Establishment of Nagaoka

The Nagaoka Festival was held for three days starting from August 1<sup>st</sup>. The celebration of the first night of the festival has been renamed as the Peace Festival. This year's festival was filled with a variety of events especially

celebrating the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary. During the festival, the citizens of Nagaoka deepened their thoughts of the festival, marking the year 2018 as a step forward to the next 100 years.

## Sending Out Our Messages of Peace



Approximately 1,200 attendees joined the Nagaoka City Peace Prayer Ceremony that was held at City Hall Plaza –  $A\hat{o}re$  Nagaoka on August 1<sup>st</sup>. There were junior high school students representing schools in the city's 11 districts as well as high school students from Fort Worth, Texas, U.S.A. (one of Nagaoka's sister cities). They each presented a white chrysanthemum to express their condolences to the Nagaoka Air Raid victims while renewing their thoughts about the misery of war and the preciousness of peace. Sixth-grade students at Kibogaoka Elementary School studied about peace. They wrote their messages of peace on memorial lanterns and released them on the Kaki River into which many citizens jumped in the midst of the 1945 Nagaoka Air Raid.

The Nagaoka Festival Grand Fireworks Show drew a total of approximately 1,040,000 spectators to the two-

night show this year. The show held on August  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  presented a variety of fireworks including Niagara Falls Super Grand Star Mine (commemorating the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary), three shots of *Shô-Sanjakudama* (3-foot-diasmeter shell fireworks) in sequence, and Phoenix Fireworks Wishing for a Complete Recovery. This year's fireworks symbolized the dawn of the next 100 years, in which we must convey our thoughts of condolences, recovery, and wishes for peace through launching these fireworks.

# **Cross-Cultural Interactions with Overseas Visitors**

Learning about Nagaoka's Disaster Prevention Countermeasures



Mr. Roy Amemiya, the Managing Director of the City and County of Honolulu, visited the Nagaoka Fire Department Headquarters and the Disaster Prevention Center to learn about the city's disaster prevention countermeasures and emergency medical system on August 3<sup>rd</sup>.

He highly valued the city's well-equipped facilities and well-organized countermeasures such as multilingual response devices in cases of emergency.

## An International Basketball Match



An intense basketball match between the Japanese women's national team and the Canadian national team (ranked 5<sup>th</sup> in the world) was held at the arena of  $A \hat{o} re$  Nagaoka on August 5<sup>th</sup>, the first international competition at  $A \hat{o} re$  in two years. The Japanese team won the game by three points. This international competition was possible thanks to Nagaoka's convenient access from Tokyo and the arena meeting international competition standards.

# Australian Swimmers Stayed in Nagaoka



The Australian Dolphins Swim Team held their training camp in Nagaoka to prepare for the 2018 Pan Pacific Championships. A team of 58 members stayed in Nagaoka for nine days starting on July 29<sup>th</sup>. In Nagaoka, their host town, local firms also provided various support to make their training environment comfortable. At the Daiei Probis Swimming Pool, interaction programs with locals were held. Some of their training sessions were open to the public. Rio de Janeiro Olympics gold medalists gave a special coaching session to local junior swimmers. Thanks to the training camp in Nagaoka, the team won eight gold medals, 12 silver medals, and seven bronze medals at the 2018 Pan Pacific Championships held in Tokyo from August 9<sup>th</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup>.

They will stay in Nagaoka again in July 2019 and 2020 for their training camps in preparation for the 2019 FINA World Championships and the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.



# How to Apply for Enrollment in Nursery Schools or Kindergartens

A new comprehensive support system for child-rearing was implemented throughout Japan in April 2015. Under this system the child-rearing support facilities for preschool-aged children are categorized into five types. If you wish to enroll your child in either one of these facilities, you must apply for both approval (*nintei shinsei*/にんてい しんせい・認定申請) and enrollment (*nyûen môshikomi*/にゅうえん もうしこみ・入園申し込み).

# For the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic Cauldron

There is a movement campaigning for an ancient flame-style pottery design for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic and Paralympic cauldron. In April 2016, the Agency for Cultural Affairs designated Kaengata Doki (Flame-Type Pottery) as a piece of "Japan

Heritage." Approximately 4,500 years ago, several ancient communities are believed to have established themselves along the Shinano River in the Nagaoka area. The original Flame-Shaped Pot (exclusively named Kaen Doki), was unearthed at the Umataka Historic Site in Nagaoka in 1936.

A group of supporters for this campaign was formed consisting of leaders of 75 municipalities and experts in the field of culture. A talk was held by Professor Emeritus Tatsuo Kobayashi of Kokugakuin University (the chairman of this supporter group) and Mr. Taku Sato, a graphic designer, at the Tokyo National Museum on August 7<sup>th</sup>.

They expressed their enthusiastic wishes for the flame-style pottery design to be used for the Olympic cauldron in 2020. There were about 360 attendees, some of whom were taking notes or agreeably nodding. Mayor Tatsunobu Isoda stressed, "Nagaoka's ancient flamestyle pottery, which is now on permanent display at the British Museum, is drawing worldwide attention. Let's come together to make our dream of presenting traditional Japanese beauty to the world come true."
