A big event was held at the Higashiyama Family Land on October 6th and 7th. A total of 24 singers and groups attracted about 11,000 fans from in and around Niigata Prefecture for two days. As soon as the concert started, the audience got into the music, jumping and clapping to the rhythm.

Many visitors also lined up to get regional specialties at various food stalls. The organizing committee is aiming to develop this event into a big seasonal program in Nagaoka. The 2019 event has already been scheduled to be held on Saturday, October 12th and Sunday October 13th. Don't miss it!

The 400th Anniversary of the Establishment of Nagaoka ROOTS



A film entitled "Tôge, the Last Samurai Warrior" is being produced, based on a book entitled *Tôge*, meaning a mountain pass, written by Ryotaro Shiba. The production of the film is drawing attention to the life of Tsuginosuke Kawai (1827-1868), the chief retainer of the Nagaoka feudal domain. He is known as the last *samurai* warrior of Japan.

Determined to become a prominent leader for the Nagaoka feudal domain, Tsuginosuke went to Edo (present-day Tokyo) to study politics and traveled through the western parts of Japan to further enrich his learning under many mentors. Upon returning to Nagaoka, he held important posts in the administration of the feudal domain.

Ryotaro Shiba wrote, "Advocating neutralism upon the outbreak of the Boshin Civil War (1868-1869) between the Tokugawa Shogunate and the New Imperial Government, Kawai negotiated with the leader of the New Government forces, but the negotiations broke off."

The troops of the Nagaoka Domain fought against the New Imperial Government forces under the leadership of Tsuginosuke Kawai. However Nagaoka was defeated and Nagaoka Castle fell. The Nagaoka troops were forced to retreat. Due to a serious injury to his left leg, Tsuginosuke died while fleeing through a mountain pass to an allied province located in present-day Fukushima Prefecture.



The film "Tôge, the Last Samurai Warrior" is scheduled to be released in 2020. We look forward to the completion of the film that will fully depict Tsuginosuke's footsteps and ambition during the turbulent times.

The National Conference of Urban Issues Held in Nagaoka



On October 11th and 12th, approximately 2,000 attendees including mayors and city council members from various locations around Japan assembled at City Hall Plaza – Aôre Nagaoka to join a national conference. They discussed various issues

mainly focusing on how to develop a hub based on administrative and civic cooperation.

Mayor Tatsunobu Isoda introduced the city's progressive projects with unique policies and strategies such as the development of child-rearing support facilities and NaDeC BASE, which is a facility connecting academia, businesses, and entrepreneurs.

Mr. Kengo Kuma (the architect who designed the city hall complex), Ms. Chie Morimoto (an art director), and Mr. Tamio Mori (the former city mayor) also took the podium and talked about the basic concept of the establishment of

the city hall complex and the citizens' positive commitments in promoting their creative activities there.

Booths and stalls were set up at Nakadoma, the roofed plaza of the complex, where visitors enjoyed local delicacies including Tochio's aburage (deep fried tofu) and Teradomari's banya jiru (fisherman's seafood soup).

A replica of ancient pottery (Kaendoki, flame-type pottery), excavated in Nagaoka was on display. Many participants also joined introductory tours of the downtown area, the mountainous Yamakoshi District,



and the Food Scrap Biogas Power Generation Center.

The conference provided a great opportunity for the City of Nagaoka to share its charms and special features with municipalities across Japan.

Productions of Two Films Related to Nagaoka's Prominent Leaders from the Past *"Tôge*, the Last *Samurai* Warrior" "The Great War of Archimedes"

This film is based on Ryotaro Shiba's <u>Tôge</u> (published in 1968), which means mountain pass. It depicts the life of Tsuginosuke Kawai (1827-1868), the chief retainer of the Nagaoka feudal domain. He is known as the last samurai warrior of Japan.

Actor Koji Yakusho plays the role of Tsuginosuke. In 2011, Yakusho also played the role of Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto, the Commander-in-Chief of the Combined Fleet of the Japanese Imperial Navy during World War II.

"Tôge, the Last Samurai Warrior" is being filmed in various locations including Nagaoka. A total of 2,000 local extras joined a battle scene that was shot on the riverbanks of the Shinano. The film will be released in 2020.



This film is based on Norifusa Mita's serial comic (since 2015) entitled "The Great War of Archimedes."

It depicts a battle of intelligence based on ingenuity, strategy, and mathematics for constructing the Battleship Yamato. In the story, Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto places a mathematics genius in an important post in order to disclose wrongdoings and prevent injustice in the construction of the battleship.

Actor Hiroshi Tachi plays the role of Isoroku Yamamoto, the Commander-in-Chief of the Combined Fleet of the Japanese Imperial Navy during World War II. The film will be released in the summer of 2019.



Sending Out Our Thoughts to the World Fireworks in Memory of War Victims and for the Pursuit of World Peace Saturday, December 8th 5:30 p.m.

In order to express our wishes to convert all the bombs of the world to fireworks, fireworks including several shots of White Chrysanthemums fireworks will be launched on the riverbanks of the Shinano on the day the Pacific War between Japan and the U.S.A. broke out in 1941.



📞 Current Topics in Nagaoka 📞

Mayor Tatsunobu Isoda has sent a civil engineer (a city employee) to flood-affected Takahashi City in Okayama Prefecture. The engineer will be staying there for six months from October and helping locals with various restoring operations. A total of five city employees from Nagaoka were also sent to earthquake-stricken Abira-Town in Hokkaido up to the end of October. They helped with inspections of damaged buildings and houses.

The Nagaoka Thermal Power Plant Company began its operation in the West Hillside East Area of the city. The company is supplying to the city the full amount of electricity they are producing by utilizing the natural gas in the South Nagaoka Gas Field. At the plant inauguration ceremony, Mayor Tatsunobu Isoda stressed that the energy-supply system based on the idea of "locally-produced, locally-consumed" can promote Nagaoka's unique industrial commitments. It has been 14 years since the Great Chuetsu Earthquake hit the Chuetsu Region including Nagaoka on October 23, 2004. Memorial ceremonies were held at various locations of the city on October 23rd. Locals of the Kawaguchi District, the epicenter of the quake, flew about 1,000 balloons from Kawaguchi Sport Park in memory of the victims, in appreciation of the support provided by many people, and with wishes for a complete recovery

The Phoenix Net System (An Emergency Medical Network)



In case of emergencies such as a sudden illness or an accident, it may be difficult for you to accurately talk about yourself or your family due to confusion or your condition.

If you have registered in the Phoenix Net System, your personal information about the medical institutions you often visit and your emergency contact can be shared with associated rescue teams.

Your registration in the Phoenix Net System allows the rescue team staff to confirm your information on site in order to immediately perform any necessary treatment or to transport you to an appropriate medical institution.

There is no charge for registration. You can apply at *Aôre* Nagaoka *Fukushi Madoguchi* (the Welfare Information

Desk at City Hall Plaza Aôre Nagaoka), Saiwai Puraza Chôju Hatsuratsu Ka (the Longevity and Liveliness Support Division at Saiwai Plaza), or Shimin Seikatsu Ka (the Citizens' Affairs and Service Division of each branch office).

Important Information about Tax Deductible Social Insurance Premiums



Your premiums or payments for the National Health Insurance, the Medical Insurance System for the Elderly Aged 75 or Over, the Public Nursing-Care Insurance System, and the National Pension Plan are all deductible on your tax return. You need to follow the proper procedures to claim your payments as a tax deduction.

Tax deductible social insurance premiums include:

National Health Insurance

(国民健康保険・こくみんけんこうほけん/Kokumin Kenkô Hoken)

- Medical Insurance for the Elderly
- •Nursing Insurance for the Elderly
- National Pension

(国民年金・こくみん ねんきん/Kokumin Nenkin)

At the beginning of November, the Japan Pension Service will send out the Social Insurance Premium Deduction Certificates(社会保険料控除証明書・しゃかい ほけんりょう こうじょしょうめいしょ/Shakai Hokenryô Kôjo Shômeisho).

When applying for a tax deduction, attach the certificate to the application form (Return Form for Insurance Premium Deduction/保険料控除申告書・ほけんりょう こうじょ しんこくしょ/ Hokenryô Kôjo Shinkokusho).

Safety Tips on How to Use Space Heaters

Most Japanese houses are not centrally heated. Space heaters and room air conditioners are widely used. Typical heating devices usually used in Japanese houses are:



sekiyu sutôbu

(kerosene heater with/without exhaust pipes or fans)



gasu sutôbu

(gas heater with/without exhaust pipes or fans)



hot carpet (electric carpet)



denki sutôbu/denki hîtâ (electric heater)



e-a-kon/reidanbôki (air conditioner)



kotatsu (low table with an electric heating device)

Here are some safety tips on how to use space heaters.

- Do not place any flammable objects around space heaters.
- Do not place heaters near doors or curtains.
- Do not dry your laundry using space heaters.
- Do not move space heaters while they are on.
- Stay a proper distance away from space heaters.
- Be sure to ventilate your room.
- Turn off kerosene heaters when refilling their kerosene tanks.
- Make sure to close the lid of the tank tightly after refilling it.
- Fill kerosene tanks in a safe place away from any flames or burning materials.
- Turn off space heaters before you go to bed.









Bus Fare Discount Services



There are three types of bus fare discount service. They are kaimono kaisûken (coupons for shopping), gold menkyo waribiki (discount for gold driver's license holders), and kyûjitsu norihôdai (unlimited rides on holidays).

You can get a book of kaimono kaisûken (coupons for shopping) with 13 tickets for the price of 10 tickets. You can use this *kaimono kaisûken* every day. However, on weekdays you can only use it between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

If you have a gold driver's license and if you show it to the bus driver, your fare will be ¥50 off all day on Saturdays, Sundays, national holidays, and December 29th and to December 31st.

You can use a *kyûjitsu norihôdai* (unlimited rides all day on holidays) pass on Saturdays, Sundays, national holidays, and from December 29th to 31st of December as well as during school holidays. This pass is ¥500 for elementary school children and younger and ¥1,000 for junior high school students and older.

However, please remember that these special bus fare discount services are not available for express buses or buses on some local routes.

Traffic Rules for Cyclists

Cyclists should always observe and follow traffic lights and signs.

Cyclists who repeatedly commit these hazardous acts two or more times within a span of three years are required to attend a cyclist safety lecture session. Cyclists who refuse to attend the lecture session will be fined up to \(\frac{4}{50}\),000.

Major Hazardous Acts

- Disregarding traffic lights.
- Ignoring stop signs.
- Violating riding rules in walkways.
- Riding while intoxicated.

- Entering a railroad crossing after the crossing bars have been lowered.
- Riding a bicycle that is not equipped with properly-functioning brakes.
- Riding while using a cell phone or holding an umbrella / parasol.





Some Useful Tips for Protecting Yourself from Catching Influenza



We are more likely to come down with a cold when it gets chilly. This is also the season in which many people catch the flu. The common cold virus and influenza virus are different. When you have a cold, you may have some symptoms in your throat or nose. Influenza usually brings about high fevers ranging from 38 to 40 degrees Celsius (100.4 – 104 degrees Fahrenheit) and affects your whole body with symptoms such as headaches, joint pains, or muscle pains. Here are some useful tips for preventing the flu.

- Wash your hands and gargle when you return home.
- Sufficient sleep and nutrition will help you resist diseases.
- Avoid crowds.
- You are advised to get a vaccination against influenza prior to the flu season. Getting a vaccination will reduce the possibility of being affected by the flu.

The flu season is usually from November to April. You are advised to get a vaccination against influenza prior to the flu season. Please contact a clinic for an appointment.

Here is a useful Japanese expression. If you want to get a vaccination against the flu, you can say "Influenza no yobô sesshu o uketai desu (I want to get a vaccination against the flu)."

You are advised to get proper treatment within two days after being infected by the flu. If you have symptoms such as high fever, muscle pains, joint pains, etc., immediately visit a clinic and get treatment as soon as possible.

This Month's Useful Japanese Expressions Kuruma no Taiya Kôkan (車のタイヤ交換・くるま の タイヤ こうかん)



In this section you can learn Japanese expressions and get information useful for your daily life in Japan.

Before the snowy months arrive, you are advised to replace regular tires with special tires for winter. Tires you use in winter are called studless tires or snow tires.

Snow-covered and icy roadways are very slippery and you cannot easily stop your car on such roadways. Therefore, you need to replace regular tires with special winter tires before the arrival of winter. Otherwise, driving with regular tires in snowy months is very hazardous.

Kuruma no taiya kôkan (tire replacing) services are available at car dealers, repair shops, service stations, or gas stations. When snow starts falling, these places will be

crowded with many drivers who rush to have their tires replaced all at once. We recommend you finish taiya kôkan as early as possible.

If you keep a snow brush in your car, it will be useful to remove any snow accumulated on the windshield, windows, and the roof of your car because the snow may obstruct your front view, which is very hazardous. Please drive very carefully on slippery snow-covered and icy roadways.
